# GRLS - RESULTS

## 1) What would your Dream Parish be like?

- When everybody kneels during consecration

- more events for older kids
- to see more baptisms as part of mass
- some way of knowing who the new members are
- people knowing who you are
- saying the rosary on a regular basis...
- something for unity to allow people to get to know each other to get people to recognize each other, personal out-reach
- introductions at the sign of peace or at least at the bigger masses
- homilies need to be tailored for younger adults, change the style every once in a while
- each mass as a family unity, and get to know the different cultures of each mass
- include in the word of God, what our various are doing, acknowledgement
- emphasize church activity to be taken advantage of before meetings, parish council liaisons need to communicate with various groups
- youth to do rosary and stations of the cross in the mass, do plays for Christmas, movie nights
- kids who could play instruments at any of the masses
- choirs for younger kids (kids from our parish do this at other parishes)
- we would have a youth mass, don't label it as such, mix it up
- retreats for kids
- we should have confession lines that are quiet, people need to know
- strengthen the ties between church and schools, incorporate events from one into the other
- kneeling for unity
- everyone would respect the church's property, sticker on the kneelers, to not put your feet up.
- Bible verses in the washrooms, on the walls of the parish, the kids did the stenciling
- lyrics of music on a flat screen
- easier music to sing to (congregationally friendly)
- suggestion box
- Nice to see kids involved in ministries and the mass, more altar servers just to be a part of it to create unity for the kids
- more spiritual instruction on a regular basis, so people could build a sense of community
- seminar or discussion on how to make journals a catholic time management
- share information on all the library resources at St. Bonaventure
- faith building things for kids, prayer cards, games etc...
- would like to have more volunteers volunteering
- would like to have parents participating, thus giving the example to their children - they will also want to be involved
- more opportunity for recycling (cans, paper, cardboard) - youth take initiative on this?
- would have a structured adult Bible study group in the evenings
- would have a children's or youth choir
- would have guest speakers teaching our faith
- would have more opportunities during the week for young families to be active in church (eg. more days for mothers' group, K of C help with funding?)
- would have announcements before mass
- would acknowledge the good work that various groups in the parish are doing for the growth of the parish
- an abundance of volunteers to man all activities
- the more you participate the more you get out of it
- have activities of all parish groups on an interactive calendar, more working together on events (KofC/CWL/PPC, etc.)
- a happening place for all ages, where everyone feels welcomed & wants to be involved in order to grow in their faith
- well informed and welcoming office staff
- young adult ministry, would need coordinator for young adults (18-35): single, married, divorced (with or without children)
- many activities for children - if children want to come to church, families will attend
- would sponsor family dances, bring your own snacks - could provide dance lessons (someone volunteered to coordinate this)
- happy, engaged (involved) people
- more youth involved as readers, ushers, altar servers, etc.
- at school, children would be challenged to be involved in their parish, also to do some charity work and volunteer
- parish-linked schools teaching sacramental preparation, altar server workshops and reader workshops

- sponsor Catholic refresher course (Catholic catechism for cradle Catholics): we would like to have theme nights to discuss different topics and a could have a question bin for discusssion questions - Catholic trivia
- That every member of the Parish is alive in the Spirit and committed to the proclamation of the Gospel.
- there would be more timeslots for youth events, Tuesdays aren't always best.
- grand piano, Spanish hymns, quiet meditative music during Communion rather than only singing throughout
- Ushers and Hospitality Ministers should be a mix of young and old people
- My dream parish would be one where the liturgies offer more of an opportunity for participation and less of an opportunity for watching and private devotion. One particular example of a parish that has achieved this comes to mind. My family and I have been blessed with several opportunities to travel to Kihei, Maui, and, while there, have attended Mass at St. Theresa's Parish. "Attended" is not the right word to use - I should say we have actively participated in Mass at St. Theresa's. As we would enter the church, we were greeted and welcomed. Finding a place to sit involved being smiled at by the person you sat next to. The choir took advantage of the people waiting for Mass to begin to go over Mass parts and to share their philosophy that they were the leaders of song, but the congregation was the actual choir. We were all told what the American Bishops mandated for posture during communion, which made all of the visitors feel comfortable and able to focus on the liturgy rather than having to focus on "what to do". When it came time for communion, the people of God did not "go up", they surged with energy and anticipation towards the altar. After the final song, the congregation erupted into chatter and laughter and cheers - I never was able to leave that building without tears of joy. There was a real sense that we were being sent forth, not that we were being released from our weekly obligation. Their bulletin gave evidence, too, of a very vibrant and involved parish. Whenever we vacationed there, our weekend revolved around including Mass - going to church never once felt like an interruption to the vacation!
- My dream parish would be one where opportunities for the people of God to learn about the Mass would be common. I believe that if you know why something is being done, you are more likely to participate rather than watch. I think sometimes we tend to focus catechesis on children, and forget that there are a lot of cradle Catholics out here who go through the motions of the Mass because that's what we've always done, but have little idea of why we do it. This education is a tricky task, because people are busy and many do not have time to come for classes. I think Father Wilbert's weekly notes in the bulletin are excellent, and I think this would be a great opportunity to answer questions people may have about the Mass in particular. I also know of a priest in the States who offers a 4 minute catechesis after communion. The more we know about the rubrics of our faith celebration, the easier it is to participate fully.
- My dream parish would be one where all of God's people are welcomed and accepted, no matter where they are in their personal faith journeys. Those who darken the doors of the building only at Christmas or Easter, or those who are not practicing but are bringing their children for sacraments are just as awesome in God's eyes as those who attend Mass every day. I think if they are good enough for God, they are good enough to deserve our open arms as well.
- My dream parish would be one where we are united in the posture of the Mass. I know that this horse has been beaten to death, but I still find it heartbreaking when we as a congregation battle over this one. It is not resolved, and unfortunately likely never will be, but it makes me feel like it is an obstacle to the full participation of God's people. I wonder what visitors to our parish think? This is one thing that truly makes me feel sad.
- having a children's liturgy to have a more inclusive mass for younger children, and there are liturgies for young children
- also songs at the children's level
- Jesus says I call you by name.... the greeting when you come in the church, some parishes say hi I'm a visitor, or a greeting before mass, it could be
- changed each week.
- we could be more welcoming to people we don't know, when new people come in we need to introduce
- working collaboratively with other groups, all of them....
- newcomer feedback - need more clarity on the books
- have the versus of scripture announced, bulletin and at mass,
- need more younger crowd
- start traditions - when kids are baptised we put up a scroll or sheep with their names on it michaelS doves etc
- uniformity of posture
- need to offer something at church for catechesis for parents of kids who don't go to catholic schools.
- mailouts from the parish are appreciated.
- mailing out of the sequence of events at Christmas - mention the website
- Identify our best catholic religion teachers in our schools, and get them to teach the teachers, by enabling the laity they we could all participate in teaching our Children better.

- learning more about other religions - to be tolerant, to understand theology, and thereby learn more about our own. - apologetics
- sharing birthdays, confirmations, marriages and announcing them at coffee...
- creating a forum of open sharing within groups
- trade show for all the ministries
- Saturday morning masses. If there are two priests.
- Kneeling during consecration.
- Show greater reverence at mass, ie. Music (Gregorian chant)
- Appeal to vast groups, provide for the needs of the different groups. Look into the need of the different groups.

- Bring on the buzz, maybe not at all masses but at the youth mass. Inspire more conversation/ community spirit between parishioners.

- An ongoing solid faith enrichment program to enhance our knowledge of the faith and its practice
- A mission at least once every two years
- A program of engagement with the schools within the parish that is serious and focused on catechesis.
- CHARITABLE WORKS
- A few well supported ones which involve adults, older and younger children
- Charities that address the needs of our community, our city our diocese and the universal church
- COMMUNITY
- a community of believers, eager to volunteer their talents for the good of the Parish not for their ego

- a community that discharges its stewardship responsibilities to support the parish and diocese financially
- occasions of recreation and fellowship where the community is built, supported and encouraged
- an effective youth program focused on the faith (rather than on the social component) that is integrated into parish life and not a separate entity.
